One of the basic differences between the new constitution, to be voted on June 6, and the state's present governing document concerns the role of the state legislature.

Today's constitution provides a number of checks and severely limits the legislature's duties, responsibilities, powers and the days it can remain in session. In the new constitution many of these checks would be removed.

For instance, no longer would cities, counties and school districts be limited by the constitution in the amount of bonds the people could approve. Now the constitution limits bonds to 5 per cent of the taxable valuation.

Under the new constitution, any limits would be the responsibility of the Legislature.

If a case of whom do you trust? If you trust your legislators, you should vote for the new constitution.

If you have doubts about your legislators, you may want to check closer and possibly vote against the new document.

A basic difference between the two documents, is a liberalization of the new constitution, leaving more decisions to current leaders and removing constitutional limitations.
