This survey was conducted February 16 - 20, 2023, with 500 likely general election voters. The survey was conducted via online panel and using an online survey platform whereby voters were only able to participate by unique, secure email invitations. Only one response was allowed per voter. This survey is weighted to adjust for response bias.
